COVID-19 Updates

Managed Isolation Facilities in the Waikato

The Public Health Unit has been playing a key role in supporting the Managed Isolation Facilities that have been operating in Hamilton since June. The three facilities currently operational are the Distinction Hotel, Ibis Hamilton, and Jet Park Hamilton Hotel.

COVID-19 Testing

The Ministry of Health has recently updated their 'Case definition and testing guidance for COVID-19' available on their website. The highest priority for testing are those who have symptoms consistent with COVID-19 and meet the higher index of suspicion (HIS) criteria or are a healthcare worker, aged care worker, Māori, Pacific, are 70 years and over, and/or significant co-morbidities. Anyone presenting with symptoms consistent with COVID-19 should be offered a test. Please continue to notify the PHU using the BPAC notification forms for those meeting both the clinical and HIS criteria. You will have heard that oropharyngeal (OP) swabs are now an acceptable alternative to nasopharyngeal (NP) swabs. Please note that sensitivity of OP swabs is less than NP, so NP is still the preferred method.

Rheumatic Fever Update

A reminder that District Nurses require an annual Community Medication Authority for Rheumatic Fever patients from their GP for their monthly Bicillin and Lidocaine. This is the perfect opportunity to review these patients on a regular basis. The District Nurses often report to us that they have been unable to get one from GPs. We would appreciate if you could prioritise this when the request comes through.

Outbreak of Meningococcal Serogroup W in a Community Hospital in the Waikato

Two confirmed cases of Invasive Meningococcal Disease (IMD) caused by *Neisseria meningitides* Serogroup W PorA type P1.5,2 (MenW) at a rural community hospital have been notified to Waikato PHU. Both cases were long term elderly residents of the GP run hospital who presented atypically to the regional Waikato Hospital eight days apart.

Case A presented with respiratory distress, a productive cough, fever and vomiting. She was treated and made a full recovery. Case B presented with respiratory distress and redness and swelling on the neck. This person rapidly deteriorated upon admission and later died. In both cases MenW was grown from blood cultures, sensitive to Ceftriaxone.

The two cases were resident in the same wing, occupied separate bedrooms but shared a communal space, sitting next to each other for meals. This was the first known outbreak in elderly long term residents of a community hospital.

Following identification of the second case all residents and staff who lived or had worked within the same shared space of the Community Hospital in the two weeks prior to the first case were offered antibiotic prophylaxis and immunisation Menactra. This was delivered with support from the local General Practice and was positively received by the local community. Information was widely circulated to increase the community vigilance for the early recognition of the signs and symptoms of IMD. MenW is known to present atypically with meningococcal pneumonia, septic arthritis, conjunctivitis.
