What? I need to disseminate my research!

The research project is finished, now for the next challenge, making your research visible to a wide audience. It's important — as it may initiate new research or lead to changes in practice.

Tips for that next step of getting your research out there:

Publishing your research

Publishing in a top ranked journal, that is indexed in the major databases, will increase the visibility of your research. Open access journals will often reach a wider audience. Check out the display in the Library next month - "Six Steps to Publish".

Conferences—oral presentations and posters

Look for calls for conference abstracts. Be wary of predatory conferences.

Request article "Invitations received from potential predatory publishers and fraudulent conferences: a 12-month early-career researcher experience"

Repositories

If your research is for your thesis your tertiary institution will add it to their repository, e.g. Auckland University offers ResearchSpace and FigShare as places to store and share your research.

Scholarly Collaboration Networks (SCNs)

[ResearchGate](#) and [Academia.edu](#) are examples of SCNs, these can be used to share research.

Role of mentors

Find support from those in leadership roles to support you within the organisation or with liaising with professional bodies. Look for organisational opportunities to disseminate your research e.g. Grand Round, newsletters, intranet posting, journal clubs and meetings.

Social networking and media

Consider sharing on LinkedIn and Twitter or using media e.g. websites, magazines, newspapers or radio. Liaise with your mentor and organisation's media group.
